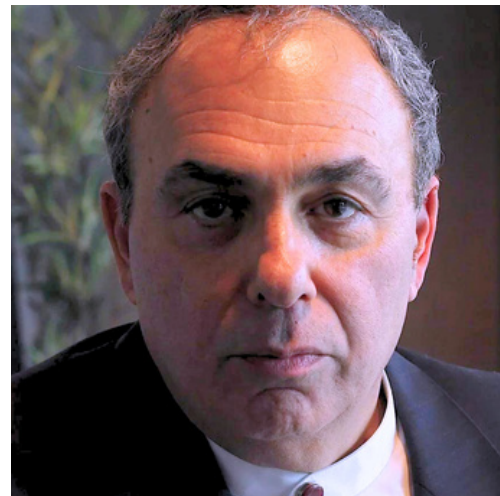

Program Notes

Alleluia For Peace (A World Premiere)

For Soprano and String Quartet

Music by James Adler

I first met the elegant and fabulous soprano Dominika Zamara when she was performing at the Progressive Musicians' 5th Laureate Gala at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall, April 2024. My Suite Moderne for Strings was also being performed at this concert. Dominika looked radiant -- and sang so gorgeously. We knew we wanted to collaborate on a project. So in November 2024, we discussed a commission for her: something Dominika could perform here in New York and also in Rome during the 2025 Papal Jubilee! I wanted to compose an "Alleluia" for her with a string quartet.

On Christmas Eve 2024, Pope Francis declared Il Giubileo del 2025 for Catholics as "Pilgrims of Hope." His dedication to Peace was something to inspire all of us, and as I began composing, the work's title came to me: Alleluia For Peace for Soprano and String Quartet. My dedication atop the score reads: Commissioned for and Dedicated to Dominika Zamara, with Admiration and Great Joy!

Marked "Serene and Sweetly" the string quartet enters in A minor with phrased down-bows; the soprano enters in measure three. The mood is calm, the music is tonal, there are some sweeping gestures in the strings. We begin to establish a yearning, adding some bi-tonality in the string parts to offset a smooth vocal line. The piece is in B-flat minor at this point. The mood becomes more somber in the strings, with dynamics "mf - mp" serving as sighs. The soprano line echoes this feeling. More building, yearning -- still in B-flat minor, but the key begins to move higher. Then we establish B-flat major, with some playful soprano triplets ringing out while the strings punctuate. This Alleluia moment leads to sweeping cello/violin 2 scales, the viola and soprano moving into a louder, joyous, upbeat mood. Repeated figures in the lower strings, with some pizzicato punctuation in violins 1 & 2, offset long and lyrical vocal lines. The music moves with cello and viola scales ascending and descending; the upper strings using up-bow and down-bow colors to help the piece end decidedly on the "upbeat." Peace. And Hope. That is what I hope my Alleluia For Peace will bring to you all.

With great joy, Alleluia For Peace will receive its World Premiere by internationally-acclaimed artists Dominika Zamara, soprano, and the Lehner Quartet at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall on June 30, 2025. In October 2025, Ms. Zamara will be performing this piece in Rome during the celebration of Il Giubileo del 2025. May we all celebrate Peace.

Crystalline Raindrops

String Quartet

Music by Vinayak Vikram

Crystalline Raindrops is one of my first pieces to explore the delicate interplay of texture, motion, and dynamic contrast. The piece is built around a recurring flickering motif that suggests various types of rainfall. These gestures are heard across textural soundscapes, often in pianissimo, creating a sense of intimacy and fragility.

Occasional surges of sound punctuate the otherwise quiet soundscape, like sudden gusts or downpours that break through stillness. A key feature is the use of cascading lines, which use registral contrasts and interwoven rhythms to evoke flowing and falling motion.

The closing theme group brings all these elements together, with both melody and accompaniment reflecting the same fine-grained, rain-like motion, gradually building to broader swells and sforzandos at the end of the final section.

Throughout, the piece avoids constant dynamic extremes, favoring nuance over force, and building expressive weight from subtle contrasts and evolving textures.

Streams of Thought

Piano Quintet

Music by Stella Claire ter Hart

This impressionistic, evocative work in four short movements was inspired by the poetry of Atlantic Canadian poet and feminist, Kay Smith (1911-2004). The spirit of each poem is vividly portrayed via imagery and tone painting. These quick and contemporary movements elicit a multitude of moods: dreamy and hallucinatory, eerie and foreboding, dystopian, flirty and fun!

- I. “At the bottom of the dark ... I awoke to hear the curtains of the rain ... and a bird in song.”
- II. “It is strange how much a stranger I feel ... in my body ... and my house.”
- III. “But who can see ... to the bottom of any well ... or any soul?”
- IV. “When a woman shops for clothes ... she surveys herself in mirrors ... with a man’s eye!”

Collaborative Pianist

Frane Rušinović



Frane Rušinović is a Croatian-American pianist. He began playing the piano at the age of 9 and has been pursuing a career as a concert pianist ever since. At the age of 10, he moved to the U.S. with his family, where he studied piano with Anna Ouspenskaya at the Levine School of Music in Washington, D.C., earning a Certificate of Distinction. He continued his studies with Boris Slutsky at the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore. At 18, he moved to Germany to study at the Hochschule für Musik und Tanz Köln, where he earned both a Bachelor's and Master's degree in piano performance under the guidance of Florence Millet, later graduating under Jacob Leuschner.

Frane has performed in numerous recitals and masterclasses with renowned pianists and has won multiple piano competitions, earning first prizes in the Alexandria Performing Arts Association Competition, the Asian-American International Piano Competition, and the MTNA State of Virginia Competition. He has appeared in prestigious venues such as Merkin Hall, Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall in New York, and the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.

As a versatile musician, Frane has collaborated with ensembles such as Enigmi Quintett and SCB Jazz Big Band, and he has performed with violinist Christopher Huber. As a collaborative pianist, he has accompanied woodwind and mandolin classes at Hochschule für Musik und Tanz Köln and performed at major competitions such as the Hans Eisler Trumpet Competition in Berlin, the Robert Schumann Voice Competition in Zwickau, as well as a voice competition at the Universität für Musik und darstellende Kunst in Vienna.

Frane has toured across Europe, performing in Germany, Austria, the Netherlands, Croatia, Luxembourg, and Russia. He has also been featured in international festivals and live TV performances, including Podium Witteman in Amsterdam. In addition to his performing career, he is an experienced educator, having taught at Bergische Musikschule in Germany, Music Hub in Saudi Arabia, and privately in the United States.

Currently, he remains active as a concert pianist, chamber musician, and educator, continuing to inspire audiences with his artistry and dedication to music.

The Chicago Kwonsa Choir



The Chicago Kwonsa Choir was founded on March 6, 2015, by five friends who attended a prayer meeting together. Inspired by Isaiah 43:21, "The people whom I formed for myself that they might declare my praise," they established the choir to offer praises to God. The purpose of the choir is to offer heartfelt and devoted praise to God, promote cultural and community service through their performances, and foster fellowship and camaraderie among the choir members. The choir exclusively performs hymns that exalt God.

Currently, the choir consists of approximately 40 members. Dr. JinUk Lee, a professor at Chicago Northern Seminary, serves as the conductor, Sarah Yun Mayer serves as pianist and Inok Lee is the team leader. The choir is open to anyone who believes in and serves God, aiming to be a place where members can experience God's presence through abundant grace in their praises, often resulting in tears of confession and testimony.

Founded on the scripture Isaiah 43:21, the Chicago Deaconess Choir has grown since its inception in March 2015. Their mission is to offer heartfelt and sincere praise to God and to engage in cultural community service through their performances. They held their first concert in April 2016 and have performed five annual concerts to date. Rehearsals are held every Saturday from 10:00 AM to 12:30 PM at Yesurun Church. The choir continues to evolve, providing an open platform for believers to join and experience the overwhelming presence of God through powerful and emotional worship. The Chicago Deaconess Choir is diligently preparing for their 6th annual concert, set to take place in September 2023, with a unified and passionate spirit.

The Lehner Quartet



Formed in 2020, the Lehner Quartet brought together four acclaimed musicians from the Kennedy Center Opera House Orchestra (Washington National Opera) and the National Symphony Orchestra: violinists Natasha and Zino Bogachek, violist Philippe Chao, and cellist Igor Zubkovsky—each an accomplished performer in their own right. United by a deep passion for chamber music and a long history of performing together on international stages, they quickly established themselves as one of the most dynamic and compelling ensembles on the contemporary classical scene.

During 2021-23 seasons, the ensemble partnered with Virtual Concert Halls and Vox Novus to present a groundbreaking series of concerts featuring new works by living composers. These performances reflect the quartet's dual mission: to honor the traditions of chamber music while amplifying fresh, diverse voices shaping the future of classical music.

Audiences have come to expect performances that bridge virtuosity, emotional depth, and innovation—offering experiences that celebrate the power and relevance of contemporary classical music.

Building on their momentum, the Lehner Quartet has been featured in multiple performances at Carnegie Hall and other prestigious venues during the 2022–2025 concert seasons. Their collaborations with composers from around the globe continue to highlight their role as champions of new music.

In 2024, the Quartet released their debut double album, *Modern Classics*, on the Cicerone Music and Arts (CiMA) label. The album showcases original works by living composers from various countries and affirms the ensemble's commitment to creating a vibrant, modern repertoire for string quartet.

The current members of the Lehner Quartet are violinists Vladimir and Yevgeniy Dyo, violist Joseph Kauffman, and founding cellist Igor Zubkovsky. The ensemble is preparing for a dynamic new season of performances and upcoming recording projects with the Cicerone Music and Arts (CiMA) label.

Pianist & Composer

AdlerOaks Music

James Adler is a pianist who “can create whatever type of music he wants at the keyboard” (Chicago Sun-Times) and a composer who writes “with uncommon imagination” (Atlanta Journal-Constitution). His latest album, *Reflections*, features “A Curtis Reflection,” commissioned by the Curtis Institute of Music as part of their 100x100 Centenary Commissioning Initiative. Henry Fogel, in his five-star review, says the work “exhibits wit, a melodic gift, a very natural feel for the keyboard, and coloristic imagination” (Fanfare). This season Mr. Adler has been commissioned by Saint Peter’s University to compose “New Beginnings” for a December premiere at Lessons & Carols. He appears in recital in October on the Interchurch Center Concert Series in New York City, and a return performance in April 2025 on the Arts on Bergen Concert Series. He joins QUO Orchestra for two performances of “Rhapsody in Blue” in March 2025.

Mr. Adler's album *Reflections* was awarded the Silver Medal – Outstanding Achievement in the 2024 Global Music Awards in both the instrumentalist and album categories. His album, *That Star in the Picture*, is a double-award winner in the 2024 Intercontinental Music Awards Pangea Classical Category. The album was also recognized in 2023 by the Global Music Awards as a Silver Medal Winner – Outstanding Achievement in the Composer category, and it landed on the 2023 Top 20 Classical (Vocal) recording list of *textura*. Luciano Feliciani (Kathodik) calls this “a disc of great value, to be savored slowly.” This “exquisite” (David DeBoor Canfield, Fanfare), “lovely collection of lighter songs” (Henry Fogel, Fanfare) features Metropolitan Opera mezzo-soprano Victoria Livengood in a chamber version of Pie Jesu from *Memento mori: An AIDS Requiem*.

Mr. Adler is honored to serve on the Sound Espresso Advisory Board. Sound Espresso - Virtual Classical/Jazz music is known for the competitions and events it hosts. In 2024-2025, performers will compete for in-person concerto appearances at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall, as well as with other orchestras throughout the world. The “James Adler Audience Favorite Award” is presented during the Laureates Gala.

Mr. Adler made his orchestral performing debut with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and has appeared in recital on the Orchestra’s Allied Arts Piano Series, and the Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concerts Series. His appearances have brought him from Chicago’s Grant Park, to London’s Royal Albert Hall (broadcast by the BBC), to Thessaloniki, Greece, to New York’s Alice Tully Hall, Symphony Space, and the Paramount Theatre at Madison Square Garden.

His extensive list of compositions is headed by *Memento mori: An AIDS Requiem*. Performed worldwide, recorded by AmorArtis Chorale and Orchestra, and published by Alfred Music, *Memento mori* features a “range of expression [that] is expansive” and is “a unique, well-crafted, emotionally rich piece” (American Record Guide). Other compositions include *Reflections upon a September morn* (poetry by Walt Whitman); *Songs of Innocence and of Experience* (poetry by William Blake); *A Winter Triptych* (Albany Records); *Monday’s Child*, performed at The Cathedral of Saint John the Divine and at The Metropolitan Museum of Art; *Carols of Splendour*, premiered at Carnegie Hall (“A cheerful, splashy tour de force, skillfully constructed and full of clever ideas,” The Choral Journal); *It’s Gotta Be America*, commissioned for the Centennial Celebration of the Statue of Liberty; and *Canticle For Peace*, written for the opening of the 43rd session of the United Nations General Assembly (published by Colla Voce Music). Mr. Adler is also the composer of *Concerto in G* for Piano and Orchestra (published by Alfred Music), the children’s “pOpera” *Herbie and Carnie: A Dinosaga*, the Classic Rag-time Suite for orchestra, numerous solo, chamber, and choral works, and the award-winning film score for *The Hat Act*.

As a performer and composer, Mr. Adler can be heard on recordings from Albany Records, Capstone, Navona, and Ravello Records. He is a member of the Arts Department at Saint Peter’s University, a National Arts Associate in the Sigma Alpha Iota International Music Fraternity, a recipient of the 2017 Marquis Lifetime Achievement Award, and in 2018 was selected for membership in the SAI Composer’s Bureau. In 2023, he was invited to join the Music Publishers Association of the United States. Mr. Adler is a Yamaha Artist.

The Host



Steve Robinson

Steve Robinson is an American radio manager, producer, and executive producer. He has held senior management positions with numerous American radio stations, including WFMT and the WFMT Radio Network in Chicago, WBUR in Boston, WGBH in Boston, WCRB in Boston, KPFA in Berkeley, WBGO in Newark, Vermont Public Radio, and the Nebraska Public Radio Network. Robinson served as general manager of the statewide Nebraska Public Radio Network from 1990 to 2000 and of WFMT and the WFMT Radio Network from 2000 until October 2016. A 50-year radio veteran, he has produced programs ranging from classical music documentaries to public affairs programs and has directed over 100 on-air pledge drives.

In 1984, he co-founded AIR (the Association of Independents in Radio), a service organization designed to assist independent radio producers in the United States. Robinson wrote AIR's first two successful grants from the New York State Council on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts. Throughout his career, Robinson has produced dozens of radio programs that have been broadcast worldwide, including live broadcasts from Salzburg, Austria (on the occasion of Mozart's 250th birthday); Durban, South Africa (for the world premiere of the opera *Princess Magogo*); Quebec City, Canada (for a live broadcast of Mahler's *Symphony of a Thousand*, with 1,000 performers); Jerusalem, Israel (for a broadcast from the Jerusalem International Chamber Music Festival); and numerous live broadcasts from Chicago and throughout the U.S. He has worked with composers such as William Schuman, Elliott Carter, Charles Dodge, Roger Reynolds, and Alan Hovhaness on programs about their music. In 2003, he created the daily classical music appreciation radio program *Exploring Music* with Bill McGlaughlin. The series is carried by state networks throughout the world, including in Australia and China. At the WFMT Radio Network, he created the first classical music radio exchange between the United States and China.

In 2000, Robinson became the general manager of WFMT and the WFMT Radio Network. Founded in 1951, WFMT is one of the most admired classical music stations in the U.S. Under his leadership, many new programs were added to the local schedule, including *Introductions*, *Impromptu*, and others. Robinson worked on diversifying WFMT's programming by expanding the amount of live broadcasting from the station.

One of his most important initiatives at the WFMT Radio Network was the creation of *Exploring Music* with Bill McGlaughlin in 2003. This daily, one-hour music appreciation program is heard on over 60 U.S. stations and has a weekly audience of more than 400,000 unique listeners. The program is also heard in Australia, Guam, the Philippines, and Beijing. Initial funding for *Exploring Music* was provided by the National Endowment for the Arts, with additional funding from individuals and foundations.

Under his leadership, the station focused on live music by broadcasting a wide array of local Chicago groups and ensembles. In 2007, the Chicago Tribune named him "Chicagoan of the Year" in the arts.

In 2015, Robinson executed a cross-cultural broadcast relationship between America and China by exporting, for the first time, broadcasts of concerts by the NY Philharmonic, LA Philharmonic, San Francisco Symphony, Dallas Symphony, Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, and Carnegie Hall to China. He also arranged for concerts from the Shanghai Spring International Music Festival and the Shanghai Symphony Orchestra to be broadcast to the West, including in the U.S., Canada, and Europe.

In 2004 and again in 2010, Robinson created and produced two live, 17-hour fundraising campaigns involving all Chicago radio and TV stations to aid victims of the tsunami in Southeast Asia and the earthquake in Haiti. Each campaign raised over \$3 million. Robinson received two Wesbury Awards from the American Red Cross of Greater Chicago for his work on the fundraising campaigns. In 2008, Robinson and Bill McGlaughlin received the Dushkin Award for *Exploring Music* with Bill McGlaughlin from the Music Institute of Chicago. He has received both local and national awards for his work in Chicago, including the Champion Award from the Merit School of Music, the ASCAP/Deems Taylor Award for creative programming, and others.

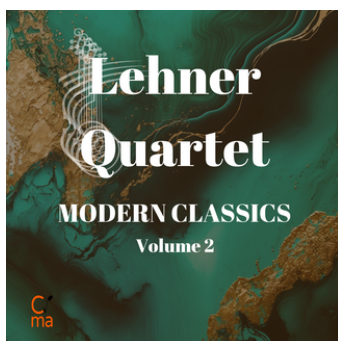

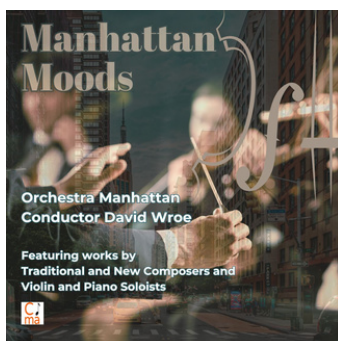

(Knabe) Competition

The William Knabe Piano Institute, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, was founded in 2016 with a mission to raise awareness about the cultural significance of the piano in America. At the Knabe Institute, founder and president, Dr. Jarl Hulbert, continues the mission that he helped create as coordinator of the discontinued William Kapell International Piano Competition. While drawing attention to the role of the piano in American history, the Knabe Institute's events also highlight today's young pianists, and invest in the pianists of tomorrow.

The inaugural Knabe Young Artist Piano Competition, held in June 2016, featured young pianists from Maryland, Delaware, Washington DC, and Virginia. Dr. Jarl Hulbert founded and directed the William Kapell Young Artist Competition in 2012 and based the Knabe Young Artist Competition on that work. The 2017 Knabe Young Artist Competition, slightly expanded over the 2016 event, allowed video applications and included special events in honor of William Knabe's 180th anniversary. The First Lady of Maryland, Yumi Hogan was an honored guest, and she presented the Knabe Competition with a Governor's Citation. 2018 saw a significant expansion, with applications requiring video, a concerto round, and nearly \$10,000 in prize money. The 2019 competition includes categories for pianists aged 18-25, in addition to the categories for the younger performers. After postponing the 2020 competition due to COVID, the Knabe Competition continued in 2021 with the addition of a virtual-only option and with the expansion of applicant ages to 6-26.

Announced first at the final round of the 2022 competition, the competition name was changed (beginning in 2023) to the Thomas F. Hulbert International Piano Competition to honor American composer, pianist, author, and pedagogue Thomas F. Hulbert (1922-1990).



The Musicians



Christina Harnisch
Pianist

Swiss pianist Christina Harnisch earned her concert diploma under Franz Joseph Hirt at the Berne Conservatory and University, followed by advanced studies with Eduardo Vercellei, Yvonne Lefébure, Louis Kentner, Vitalij Margulis, and Bruno Mezzena. She has received numerous national and international awards, including the “Prix de Virtuosit  ” from Neuch  tel, and has built an extensive international career as a soloist, chamber musician, and orchestral performer. Harnisch has performed with ensembles such as the S  dwestdeutsche Philharmonie, Berner Symphonieorchester, San Francisco Sinfonietta, and the Orquesta Nacional del Per  . Her repertoire spans from Bach to contemporary works, with a special focus on music by women composers including C  cile Chaminade, Clara Schumann, Fanny Mendelssohn, and Grazyna Bacewicz.

Harnisch has performed in major venues like the Tonhalle Z  rich, Wiener Konzerthaus, Purcell Room London, Forbidden City Concert Hall in Beijing, Shanghai Oriental Art Center, and Teatro Municipal Vi  a del Mar. She has toured extensively throughout the USA, South America, Europe, China, Thailand, India, and Chile. Notable appearances include solo recitals in Belleville and St. Louis, USA as part of the “Great Pianists of the World” series, and concerto performances of Clara Schumann and Chaminade works in Poland and the USA. In November 2023, she performed Clara Schumann’s concerto with the University City Symphony Orchestra in St. Louis. She is scheduled to appear as a soloist at Carnegie Hall, New York, in June 2025.

Harnisch frequently collaborates with flutist Romano Pucci, performing internationally at festivals including Freiburg’s Klavierfestival, Orbetello Pianofestival, Ruggero Leoncavallo Festival, and the Festival della Lingua Italiana in Bangkok. Her work has been featured in numerous radio, CD, and television broadcasts.



Andrea Causaprana
Guitarist

Andrea Causaprana developed a passion for music at a young age, starting with classical guitar and later exploring electric guitar throughout his high school years. He played in various bands, spanning genres from early blues to experimental rock. Andrea studied at the Conservatory of Santa Cecilia in Rome under Giuliano Balestra, graduating with top honors in guitar. He furthered his studies at the Accademia Chigiana in Siena with Oscar Ghiglia and continued with Stefano Grondona in Brescia. His classical repertoire spans from the Renaissance to contemporary works. Andrea is also known for performing Spanish Golden Age music on the vihuela and 19th-century music on period instruments. He has performed in numerous festivals and events both in Italy and internationally, earning recognition at several national and international competitions. In 2006, he received the Silver Plaque of the Italian Presidency of the Republic as the overall winner of the Anemos Music Competition in Rome.

As a teacher, Andrea has given masterclasses in Mexico City at the Escuela Nacional de M  sica and the Instituto Superior de Bellas Artes, and holds a degree in Music Didactics. He currently teaches in public schools. Andrea is also a composer, and his album “The Lover’s Suitcase”, released by World Fonogram Records in 2023, received international acclaim. He has written soundtracks for films and music for theater productions. His passion for theater led him to found the collective “Il Teatro Invisibile” in 2017. In 2021, his project “Siamo Tutti Lupi Cattivi” was a finalist at the Rome Fringe Festival (Tube section), and in 2024, he debuted with the play Tungsteno by Antonio Mocchiola.



Ethan Zhao
Pianist

Ethan Zhao is a fourteen-year-old pianist from Urbana Middle School in Maryland. He began studying piano at the age of seven under Mrs. San-Qing Lu Bennaman and has developed a deep passion for classical music.

Ethan has won top prizes in prestigious competitions, including the MSMTA Spring Festival Piano Solo Competition, the Miriam Shields Gottlieb Competition, and the Washington Universal Piano Competition. He has also been recognized in international competitions such as the International Young Artists Piano Competition, the American Prot  g   International Piano and Strings Competition, and the Thomas F. Hulbert International Piano Competition.

Beyond competitions, Ethan has been invited to perform at distinguished venues, including Carnegie Hall, the Bulgarian Embassy, and the Washington International Piano Festival. Passionate about sharing his music, he has spent the past three years performing at local senior centers, bringing joy and connection to his community.

Outside of piano, Ethan enjoys swimming, reading, and running.



Katharina Nohl
Composer

In June 2023, Katharina's composition Rave for Hackbrett and orchestra was awarded the Amadeus Composition Award (Austria) with silver. Prior to that, her commissioned orchestral composition for Hackbrett and orchestra was premiered in April 2023 in Switzerland with the Sinfonieorchester Kanton Schwyz, conducted by Urs Bamert, with Olga Mischula on Hackbrett and Cymbal. In December 2022, her Piano Rhapsody "Spices" received the Global Music Award in Silver for creativity and composition – a perfect ending to a fruitful year!

Reflecting on her journey, Katharina sees music through the lens of a pianist, audience member, mother, mentor, publisher, and festival organizer. She has built a career that emphasizes inclusivity, performing across Europe, Russia, and the Arabian Peninsula. These experiences, shaped by both Western and non-Western cultural influences, along with classical and modern elements, have contributed to her distinct musical voice. Katharina credits her first piano teacher with introducing her to Eastern music and the works of female composers. This experience inspired her to champion other composers, leading to the creation of the inaugural Swiss Female Composers Festival – a platform for networking, collaboration, and the performance of new works.

In 2002, Katharina moved to Switzerland, where she built a family and started a new chapter in her life. While her years of traveling slowed down, a new and exciting journey began. With her two daughters, family, and cats in tow, Katharina continued to perform across Europe, while also initiating interdisciplinary art projects for children, combining music and visual arts in live concerts. She finds joy in creating lasting memories, giving children the chance to experience classical music firsthand.

Katharina's interest in arrangement and composition blossomed organically. Encouraged by fellow composers and pianists, she has since composed various orchestral works, chamber pieces, arrangements, and numerous piano works. Her music has been performed in countries including Russia, Turkey, the UK, Germany, Switzerland, Albania, and more.

In January 2019, Katharina realized her long-held idea of connecting and promoting female composers through the establishment of the Swiss Female Composers Festival. In April 2023, she published the first piano book featuring works by living female composers of Switzerland through Universal Edition, with plans for a 2024 edition of violin and piano music.

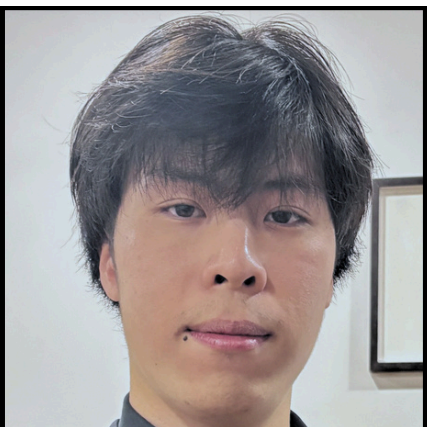

Jayson Martinez
NJ Guitar Orchestra

Jayson Martinez is recognized as the first guitar major student in the history of the prestigious Arts High School in Newark NJ, the nation's first high school for the visual and performing arts. Now, as Director of Guitar Studies at his alma mater, Mr. Martinez has garnered countless educational awards, including winner of the Teacher of the Year Award in 2018-19 and nominee for the GRAMMY Music Educator's Award. His students are continuously invited to perform in several prestigious venues across the country. This includes performing for Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona in Washington DC, NAFME All-National Festivals, and opening for Grammy Award duo Rodrigo y Gabriela.

As a student, Jayson attended New Jersey City University, studying under Dr. Ana María Rosado, and earned degrees in Music Education (B.A.), Music Performance (M.Mus.), and Educational Supervision and Administration (M.EdLd.). He was a featured soloist who performed for many renowned classical guitarists, including Roland Dyens and William Kanengiser.

Currently, Mr. Martinez serves as the New Jersey Music Educators Association (NJMEA) Chairman for Guitar Education, Director of the NJMEA Honors Guitar Ensemble, and National Association for Music Education (NAfME) Eastern Division Representative for the Council of Guitar Education. Mr. Martinez is also the Guitar Studies Adjunct Professor at Kean University.

An established classical guitarist, Mr. Martinez served as the concertmaster for the renowned New York City Classical Guitar Orchestra for over a decade. He is featured in podcasts for Bill Swick's "Guitarists in the Classroom" series and for TopMusic.co.

In 2021, Maestro Jayson Martinez founded the New Jersey Guitar Orchestra (NJGO), where he also serves as conductor. In 2022, the NJGO was featured in NYC Merkin Hall, performing with the United States Guitar Orchestra.

Staying true to his roots, he is the owner of Tremolo Music Studio in Clifton NJ, where he teaches music education to aspiring musicians of all ages.



Momoro Ono
Pianist

Momoro Ono is an accomplished pianist who has given numerous concerts and masterclasses across the world, including performances at the University of British Columbia, Emory Chamber Music Society of Atlanta, Xavier University Music Series in Cincinnati, Cincinnati Conservatory of Music Bearcat Piano Festival, Seoul National University Tuesday Concerts, University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, and the Kennedy Center Concert Hall. He has appeared as a soloist with prestigious orchestras such as the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra and Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, with the latter performance being broadcast on NPR.

In 1980, Momoro won First Prize at the Juilliard Gina Bachauer Memorial Competition and the Silver Medal at the Three Rivers International Piano Competition within just two weeks. Shortly thereafter, he performed on WQXR in New York during the Young Artists Showcase.

Momoro holds a Doctorate and Artist Diploma from the Peabody Institute, where he studied with the legendary Leon Fleisher. He also earned both his Master's and Bachelor's degrees from the Juilliard School as a student of Adele Marcus. His chamber music studies include coaching with members of the Guarneri Quartet, particularly alongside his violinist wife, Heejoung Kim.

In addition to his performing career, Momoro is an esteemed teacher of piano at Creighton University and the Omaha Conservatory.

Pianist

Abigail Nossaman (14), from Northern Virginia, has been studying piano with Anna Ouspenskaya at the Hunter Mill Music Studio since the age of six. Currently a rising ninth grader at The Madeira School in McLean, Virginia, Abby has been a finalist in the Northern Virginia Music Teachers Association Concerto Competition for four consecutive years. She was also a prizewinner in the International Great Composers Competition, earning recognition in the Best Bach Performance category.

Abby is passionate about sharing music with others, regularly performing for assisted living communities across Northern Virginia as part of a student-led volunteer ensemble. 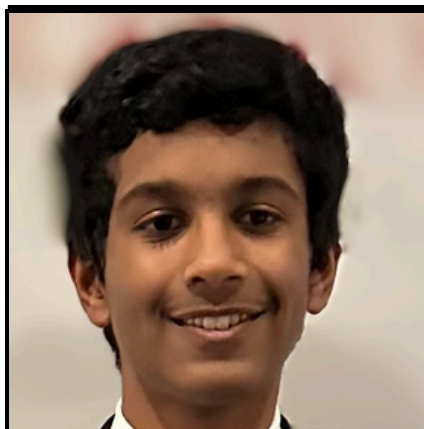
Stella ter Hart
Composer

Stella ter Hart is a Canadian composer, educator, and choral director born in Estevan, Saskatchewan. A first-generation Canadian, she is poignantly inspired by her rich European background, including French Huguenot ancestors fleeing to the Netherlands in the 15th century to avoid persecution and the loss of her grandmother's entire Jewish family (over 600 relatives) in WW2 concentration camps, among them her 79-year-old great-grandfather, and a little seven-year-old cousin, also named Stella.

Ms. ter Hart was the Head of Music at Rothesay Netherwood School in New Brunswick for six years, after which she moved to Ontario and joined the Toronto Conservatory College of Examiners in the Theory/History Department.

Stella has adjudicated countless Music Festivals across Central, Northern, and Eastern Canada. She now focuses on composition, particularly choral and instrumental works. Her style has been described as contemporary yet refreshing, and highly accessible with flashes of the avant-garde. Stella has been commissioned by CBC Radio 2, Symphony New Brunswick, the Indian River Festival, and various professional soloists and ensembles. Her award-winning compositions have been performed throughout North America and as far from home as Australia, Hong Kong, China, Spain, Brazil, Peru, Greece, Austria, and the United Kingdom.

Stella is directly descended from the Italian composer Tomaso Vitali (a fun fact) and, to date, is the only individual in Canada to be awarded all four available ARCT diplomas from the Toronto Conservatory of Music: pedagogy, performance, composition, and theory.



Vinayak Vikram
Composer

Vinayak Vikram is a passionate young musician with a deep love for classical music. He has been learning the recorder and violin for several years and has recently taken up composition, focusing on creating original works.

Vinayak plays the full range of the recorder family, including Soprano, Alto, Tenor, and Bass. He uses Mollenhauer Modern Alto and Soprano recorders, having extended their upper range beyond accepted fingerings. He recently acquired a Helder Tenor recorder, capable of covering the full range of the flute, and has mastered rapid scales up to E7, showcasing his ability to handle flute repertoire. Vinayak has competed in numerous recorder festivals, often performing with the Alto and Soprano recorders. Notably, he won 1st prize in the Baroque Woodwinds section of the American Virtuoso International Music Competition, which led to a performance at Carnegie Hall in September. For this event, he arranged and performed Bach's Chaconne from the Partita in D minor. He also placed 3rd at the American Talent Competition and 2nd at the JS Fest International Competition, both with his arrangement of the third movement of the Sibelius Violin Concerto. Additionally, he is the only youth member of the Mid Peninsula Recorder Orchestra.

Vinayak began studying composition at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music in the fall of 2023. His original compositions have already garnered attention: he won the Beeffie Award for Best Creative Video at the Beethovinci Online Music Competition and the Gold Award for Best Original Composition at the Reinecke International Online Competition. He also received the Beethovinci award for his original composition for recorder quartet in G minor. Vinayak was a regional finalist in the National Federation of Music Clubs Junior Composer Competition with his String Quartet in D minor.

In his short time as a composer, Vinayak has written several solo works for recorder, including Concertinos for violin in A minor, as well as two movements of a symphony—one in E major focusing on strings, and the second in E minor focusing on winds. He draws inspiration from Classical and Romantic composers, particularly Mozart and Mendelssohn, and from the beauty of nature. Recently, he has started exploring the music of other cultures and world music, especially the sounds of his cultural roots.

As a violinist, Vinayak plays in the California Youth Symphony (CYS), where he had the honor of being concertmaster of the Intermezzi Ensemble in 2023. This experience has significantly influenced his composition for chamber strings and symphony orchestra.



Vladimir Dyo
Violinist

Since his debut with the Kazakh State Symphony Orchestra at age 12, Vladimir Dyo has toured and performed at prestigious venues of the former USSR, Europe, Asia, and the United States, including Carnegie Hall, Walt Disney Hall, Seoul Arts Center, Rachmaninoff Hall, Tchaikovsky Hall, Column Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall, KBS Hall, UNESCO, United Nations General Headquarters etc. His individual tone and personal approach to phrasing set him apart from his peers.

Since his debut with the Kazakh State Orchestra at the age of nine, Yevgeniy Dyo has performed at prestigious venues in the former Soviet Union, Europe, Asia, Canada, and the United States, including Carnegie Hall, Alice Tully Hall, Kimmel Center, Tchaikovsky Hall, Mozarteum Wiener Saal, Meyerson Hall, Astana Philharmonic Society Presidential Hall, Embassies of the Vatican and South Korea, and the United Nations General Headquarters. He has won numerous awards from foundations and national and international competitions, including the grand prize at the Shabyt International Chamber Music Competition, Astana, Kazakhstan, and the International Organization "New Names" Award, Moscow, Russia.



Joseph Kauffman
Violist

Joseph Kauffman, a versatile violinist and violist, has studied under the guidance of prominent musicians such as Yayoi Numazawa of the Philadelphia Orchestra, James Lyon, and Max Zorin of The Pennsylvania State University, and Dr. Eduard Schmieder of Temple University. He holds degrees in violin performance from Penn State University (BM) and Temple University (MM) and is currently pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts (DMA) degree at Temple University.

His performances have taken him to some of the world's most prestigious concert halls, including Tchaikovsky Hall, Disney Hall, Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, the Kimmel Center, the Mariinsky Theatre, and the Kennedy Center, among many others.

A highly accomplished performer, Joseph received 1st Prize in the MTNA Chamber Music Competition and has won the Beene, Kroulik, and Brewster solo competitions. He has been honored with the Albert Tashjian and Max Aronoff Prizes from Temple University for excellence in performance and teaching, as well as the Creative Achievement Award from Penn State University for his memorable performances.

In addition to his competition success, he has appeared as a soloist with the PSU Philharmonic, Williamsport Chamber Orchestra, Temple Symphony Orchestra, and many other ensembles.



Igor Zubkovsky
Cellist

Igor Zubkovsky began his cello studies in his native Russia and made his solo debut at the age of twelve, performing Haydn's C Major Cello Concerto with the Minsk State Philharmonic Orchestra. He later studied at the Moscow Conservatory with Natalia Shakhovskaya, Gold Medalist of the 1962 Tchaikovsky Competition.

Mr. Zubkovsky has earned top prizes at several international competitions, including Second Prize at the International Cello Competition in Minsk, Belarus, and the Grand Prix at the Tansman Competition in Lodz, Poland. As a member of "The Brahms Trio" in Moscow, he won Second Prize at the Trapani International Chamber Music Competition in Italy and First Prize at the Weimar International Chamber Music Competition in Germany.

With an impressive record of performances and awards, he was awarded a full scholarship to the Peabody Conservatory of Music, where he earned a Graduate Performance Diploma.

A tenured member of the Kennedy Center Opera House Orchestra for over 20 years, Mr. Zubkovsky continues to perform extensively as a soloist and chamber musician. He has appeared at Merkin Concert Hall in New York, the prestigious Newport Music Festival, and has performed recitals in Massachusetts and at the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC. Live recordings of his concerts are frequently broadcast on television and over the Internet.

A founding member of The Lehner String Quartet, he also performed as a cellist with the critically-acclaimed Veronika String Quartet in 2021-2022.



Dominika Zamara
Soprano

SPolish soprano Dominika Zamara gained early recognition for her remarkable voice. In 2007, she graduated with honors from the Wrocław University of Music and moved to Italy to pursue advanced studies. She also manages her Online Castanet School, offering international workshops and masterclasses.

As a performer, Laiz has appeared on stages across Spain, Europe, the United States, and beyond. Notable venues include the Musikverein in Vienna, Carnegie Hall in New York, and the National Auditorium in Madrid. She has collaborated with distinguished artists such as Montserrat Martí Caballé, Luis Santana, Nancy Fabiola Herrera, and Sergio Bernal. In both 2022 and 2023, she performed at Carnegie Hall after winning the Progressive Musicians International Music Competition. In 2024, she won First Prize in the Fanny Mendelssohn International Competition alongside soprano Marta Casas.

Laiz is the founder of both the International Castanets Festival and the Teresa Laiz International Castanet Competition. She continues to compose, perform, and promote castanets as a solo instrument while expanding her Castanet Method publications and directing the Orchestra of Rare Instruments and the Castanets Choir of Madrid.



JinUk Lee

Dr. JinUk Lee has an extensive and distinguished career as a baritone soloist, performing oratorio solos both in Korea and the USA. His notable performances include the baritone solos in Handel's Messiah and Haydn's The Creation. Dr. Lee received his early training under Professor InSoo Park in South Korea and continued his studies with renowned professors Andreas Poulimenos and Carol Vaness at Indiana University.

He is a recipient of the Sweet Adelines International Award from the Young Singers Foundation and the Albert Rees Davis Scholarship from the S. Livingston Mather Scholarship Competition in Cleveland. Furthermore, he won first place in the National Association of Teachers of Singing Competition and was a finalist in the Mario Lanza International Singing Competition in Italy. His academic and performance excellence was recognized with the Merit Award Scholarship, and he served as an opera assistant at the Lyric Theatre at the University of Illinois for three years, performing roles such as Ford in Falstaff, Street Singer in The Threepenny Opera, and Riolo in Florencia en el Amazonas.

Currently, Dr. JinUk Lee is a professor and the director of the Master of Arts in Worship Korean Track at Northern Seminary in Chicago, IL. He also serves as the music director of four different choirs in the Chicagoland area. Dr. Lee holds degrees from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (DMA), Ohio University (MA), Indiana University at Bloomington (PD), and Kyungpook National University (BA). He began his teaching career as a music professor at Indiana Wesleyan University in Marion, Indiana, and continues to be represented professionally by Vocal Artists Management as a baritone singer.

In addition to his academic and musical endeavors, Dr. Lee actively promotes his work through various media outlets. He has been featured in broadcasts and interviews on Far East Broadcasting Company (FEBC) in Seoul and Daejeon, MCTV-Chicago Win Media, and GOODTV in Korea. His future performance plans include collaborations with distinguished artists in both the United States and Korea, with engagements at the Chicago Korean Cultural Center and FEBC in Seoul and Daejeon. Dr. Lee's contributions to music and his dynamic presence in both academic and performance spheres highlight his exceptional talent and dedication to the performing arts.

Andrew currently serves as Section Leader Two in the New Jersey Guitar Orchestra (NJGO).

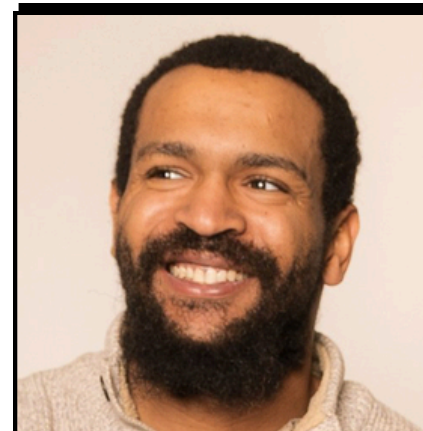


Cem Yigit

Chris Joseph

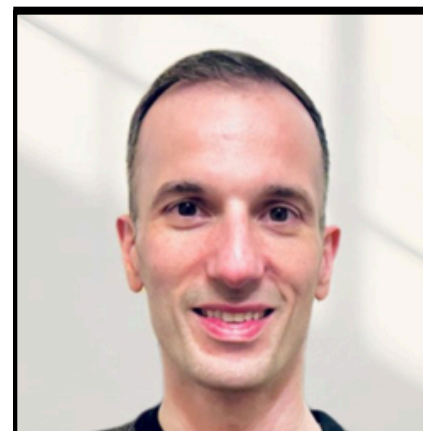

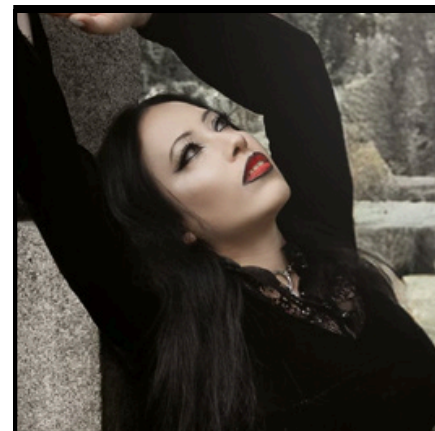


Dr. Steven Sabet

Jo is thrilled to continue this musical journey in college and aims to combine a passion for guitar with a dedication to teaching and inspiring future musicians.

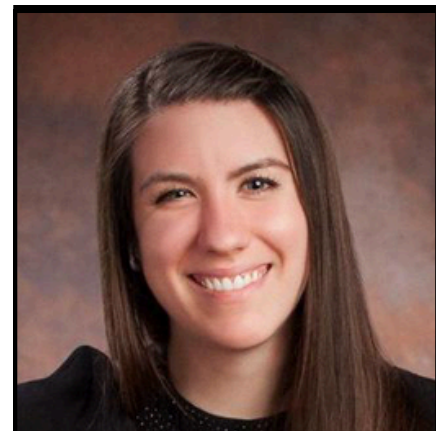


Jonathan Cruz

She currently serves as the director of the 4th, 5th, and 6th-grade orchestras, as well as the kindergarten general music teacher and guitar instructor.

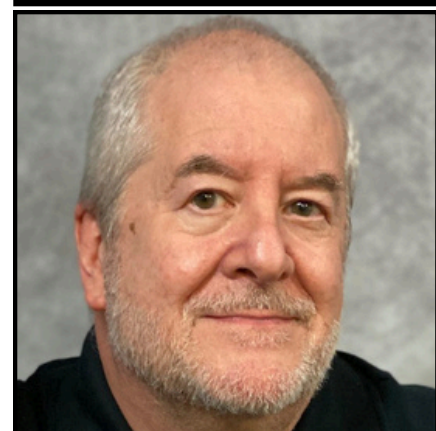


Patrick Callahan

She pursued additional doctoral studies at the Sorbonne in Paris on a Mellon grant, and at the University of Cologne, Germany as a Fulbright Scholar.

Through her extensive performance career, Dr. Overholt has traveled to over 80 countries. She is the founder of the classical guitar program at Hunter College, CUNY, in Manhattan, where she serves as a professor of classical guitar performance, coaches chamber music, and is the undergraduate advisor for the music minor program.

Dr. Overholt is the author of Stockhausen's Musical Shapes: How a Master Composer Moves Sound, which is internationally available. She is also a returning teacher for the renowned annual New York Guitar Seminar.
